

COMPOUND AND COMPLEX SENTENCES

What is a Compound Sentence?

Two or more sentences joined together are known as a **compound sentence**. The simple sentences in a compound sentence can be joined together with a **comma and a conjunction**, or with a **semicolon**.

The simple sentences in a compound sentence are usually joined by a comma and a conjunction such as:

and, but, or, for, so, yet, nor

Example: Carrie and Evan joined the group, **and** they all went to the soccer game together. *Note: everything before the comma is a complete, simple sentence, and everything after 'and' is a complete, simple sentence. Together, they form a compound sentence.*
