

RECONSTRUCTION AFTER THE CIVIL WAR

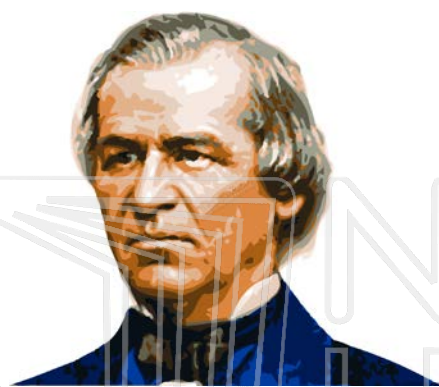
The years after the Civil War were dedicated to trying to resolve the problems that were not only the cause of the war but were aggravated by the four years of fighting between the Union and the Confederacy.

The issue at the forefront of the Reconstruction was what rights were to be granted to Freedmen as a result of their new citizenship. While many people agreed that there should be "separate but equal" status, there were also a great number of people who fought for equality among all citizens of the United States. The **13th, 14th and 15th Amendments** were all passed during the Reconstruction in response to these different points of view, each of which addressed the **rights of African Americans** in the United States.
